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



Fukuoka Women's University has only one College, the International College of Arts and Sciences, which has three departments offering broad-based, comprehensive education that integrates the humanities and sciences with the aim of providing students with the specialized knowledge and wide-ranging skills necessary to thrive in an international environment.

Undergraduate Overview

International College of Arts and Sciences

Department of International Liberal Arts

Students are free to select courses that align with their personal learning goals, ranging from academic disciplines such as ideology and culture, literature, language and language education, history, economics, politics and law, business management, and sociology, to area-focused courses that include Japan, Asia. Europe, the Americas, and global studies, Through these courses, they foster the ability to think logically, multi-dimensionally, and creatively. Students are also expected to develop autonomy and self-regulation. problem-solving skills, and leadership capabilities.



Department of

Course of Natural and **Environmental Sciences**

(Environmental Substances/Life and Environment)

This course explores phenomena related to substances and life with the aim of building a society in harmony with the environment.

Course of Environmental Management

(Environmental policies and lifestyles / Living environment design / Environmental information and data science)

In this course, students comprehensively study the above three areas while exploring the human behaviors that best contribute to improving the environment



Department of Food and Health Sciences

National Registered Dietitian Training Course

Students who complete the required credits will, upon graduation, earn a dietitian license and become qualified to take the examination for national registered dietitians. Those aspiring to become a national registered dietitian will sit for the national exam held at the end of the academic year of their graduation.

Note: The national registered dietitian license does not meet the status of residence (work visa) eligibility requirement.

The Department of Environmental Science is scheduled to stop accepting applications in FY2026. and the Department of Environmental Science and Technology (tentative name) and the Department of Living Environment Design and Informatics (tentative name) are scheduled to be established in FY2027.

Why do students live in the dormitory?

All first-year students entering the university reside at the International Friendship House NADESHIKO. This on-campus joint housing for international and Japanese students is both a place of residence and a place for learning. Sharing everyday life with Japanese students provides great opportunities for international students to develop initiative, independence and the ability to be proactive.

Four students share a dormitory unit consisting of four private rooms, each with a balcony

A dormitory unit is shared by four students with one private room per student. The resident composition per unit is one international student (first- to fourth-year) and three first-year Japanese students. Dormitory life enables students to develop interpersonal skills, cross-cultural sensitivity, and communication skills in foreign languages. International students are expected to build good relations with Japanese students and contribute to the internationalization of the university.







Well-maintained living environment for starting your new student life

Each private room is fitted with a bed and desk. Students are not expected to have everything when they arrive. It is more fun and economical to gradually buy what you need as vou settle in.

On-campus dormitory ensures easy access to classes

On-campus housing means no time lost on commuting, giving students more time to focus on their studies and extracurricular activities. Fitted with the necessary equipment and facilities for starting a new student life, the Building D dormitory provides management support and quality security services, and ensures a safe dorm life experience.

Students can prepare their own meals or eat at the cafeteria (open on weekdays from 11:30 am to 1:30 pm). Meals The university co-op J Shop is open on weekdays from 8:30 am to 5:00 pm. Note: Hours are subject to change The main entrance is fitted with a card-key type automatic lock system, and a security system with surveillance cameras and security guards is in place.

Management staff is on duty at all hours. Dorm residents must return by 11:00 pm; the curfew extends from 11:00 pm to 5 am. and security Overnight stay outside on weekdays during the semester is not allowed

Support Programs



Will I have the opportunity to study Japanese after entering the university?

FWU offers on- and off-campus opportunities for international students to develop Japanese language skills and academic skills using the Japanese language. We help students achieve their potential through a Japanese language program that meets their individual learning needs.



Japanese Language Program

(Academic and Career Japanese Language Program)

This is a Japanese language program for international students in their first and second years of study.

As well as developing the four skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing in Japanese, the program provides the basic knowledge necessary for conducting daily life in Japan and enables students to make oral presentations and write academic essays in Japanese by the end of the course.

Japanese Language Proficiency Test not required for admission

FWU does not require the Japanese Language Proficiency Test administered by the Japan Foundation and Japan Educational Exchanges and Services for admission. Nevertheless, students are expected to have Japanese language skills sufficient to understand lectures conducted in Japanese, and are strongly encouraged to master the language.

What student support programs are available?

FWU has a buddy program to help international students settle in smoothly upon arrival. International students can develop real-life Japanese conversation and communication skills while making new Japanese friends through this program.



JD-Mates support international students

Japanese students volunteering to assist international students are designated by the university as JD-Mates (Joshi-Dai-Mates). Generally, each international student is matched with a JD-Mate who will help them adjust to campus and academic life by assisting with such matters as entry into Japan, settling in the dormitory, opening a bank account, and purchasing insurance.

Is financial support available for international students?

International students are fully exempt from the matriculation fee to help reduce their financial burden. Furthermore, FWU supports hard-working international students by offering a tuition reduction/exemption program for those who achieve a certain level of academic performance.

Full tuition exemption

Applies to students who meet either A or B below. (Maximum 10 students)

A.An EJU score in the top 20% of all examinees in "Japanese language" and an average score or higher in at least one other subject.

B.A score surpassing the "full exemption" threshold for one of the English language exams indicated in the table below.

Half tuition exemption

Applies to students who meet either A or B below. (Maximum 10 students)

A.An EJU score in the top 30% of all examinees in "Japanese language" and an average score or higher in at least one other

B.A score surpassing the "half exemption" threshold for one of the English language exams indicated in the table below.

Taking advantage of the "pre-arrival admission" system

The "pre-arrival admission" system allows applicants living outside of Japan to take the required examinations and secure admission to higher educational institutions in Japan without leaving their home country. FWU administers entrance exams in South Korea and Malaysia for general international applicants, and in Vietnam, Thailand, and Malaysia for applicants recommended by an FWU partner institution. Admission decisions are made based on the scores of the Examination for Japanese University Admission for International Students (EJU) managed by the Japan Student Services Organization (JASSO), taken outside of Japan. By taking advantage of this system, applicants can sit for the EJU and gain university admission without having to travel to Japan.

Scholarship from the Japan Student Services Organization (JASSO)

Students admitted to FWU through the pre-arrival admission system are eligible to apply for a scholarship under JASSO's "Reservation Program for the MEXT Honors Scholarship for Privately Financed International Students (recommended by the university)."

FYI: In the 2025 academic year, the scholarship awarded 48,000 yen x 12 months (spring semester entrants) or 48,000 yen x 6 months (fall semester entrants).

While there is no FWU scholarship program for privately-financed international students, FWU recommends scholarships offered by the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology (MEXT), Japan Student Services Organization (JASSO), and other foundations and organizations

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Admissions



There are two types of application options: (a) Admission for general international students and (b) Admission for international students recommended by an FWU partner institution.

In either admission process, applicants are asked to submit their scores on the EJU. Applicants can take the EJU and gain admission without traveling to Japan by using the pre-arrival admission system.

Note that a recommendation from an FWU partner institution is required to apply through application option (b) above.
